Sr. Marcella Marie Garus has served Villa Maria College passionately, diligently, completely, whole-heartedly, for 50 years. She started at Villa Maria in the Business Office before being selected, in 1978, as the third president in Villa Maria's history.

Sr. Marcella has touched the life of every person in this room, directly and indirectly, many times over, as well as the lives of countless other people—students, past faculty and staff members, parents, friends, donors, board members, community leaders, parishioners, fellow sisters, and family members. All of us have words we'd like to share about Sr. Marcella—a favorite memory, a funny story, a personal homage. We should all take any opportunity we can to share these stories and thoughts with her, to thank her for bringing us here to Villa, this special, unique, mission-driven college.

For the last 40 years, Sr. Marcella has been Villa Maria College, its face, its complete embodiment. She has led us through good times and bad, through lawn fetes and commencements, board dinners and basketball games, honors convocations and President's Cabinet meetings, orientations and weekly masses, building acquisitions and academic transitions, outsourcings and doing it in house, MIDNIGHT bingos—let that one sink in—and hot air balloon rides, Christmas parties and Middle States visits, and, perhaps the things dearest to her heart—general college meetings with all of us, and days away with all of our families.
